Participants in We Are All Criminals tell stories of crimes they got away with. The stories range from humorous to humbling, but all have one thing in common: they are privately held memories without public stigma. Each shows that often times the only thing separating *clean* from *criminal* is who gets caught.



PRIVATE MEMORY:

I'M A BANK TELLER AND I COMMITTED THEFT

It happened in college in the women's bathroom. I was washing my hands when a woman walked in, plopped her purse on the shelf and disappeared into a stall. Before the toilet had even flushed, I had plucked her wallet from the bag and was out the door.

I didn't need the money, but I wanted it. I think I bought beer, maybe peanut butter with it.

It was 80 bucks, but it didn't last long.

She had tickets to The Clash that night. I dumped them in a trash bin a few blocks away. I still feel bad about that.

Regulations meant to improve banks by weeding out high-level executives convicted of fraud have ensnared at least one lower-level employee [reports the New York Daily News](#). Mr. Eggers was convicted in 1963 of using a fake dime in a Laundromat. In 2012, Wells Fargo fired Mr. Eggers from his position as a customer service representative as a result of his crime and the new regulations.

PUBLIC RECORD:

THEFT

They were in a parking lot when his girlfriend started yelling at him. He was pissed, so he left her and drove off. A mile down the road he realized her purse was on the front seat and, still angry, he threw it out the window into a ditch.

A bystander called the police, trying to get a ride home for the stranded young woman. **By the time he came back, her purse covered in grime, the cops were waiting for him. He was arrested and charged with Theft – Domestic Violence Related. He'd never touched her.**

He was acquitted at trial but the charge still haunts him. It was the reason he lost his years' old job as a union driver, and now his child support payments are in arrears.
